

Large Goods Vehicle (LGV) Driver Apprenticeship

Large Goods Vehicle Driver Apprenticeship

What is a Large Goods Vehicle (LGV) driver apprenticeship?

An apprenticeship is a training programme that is completed whilst also working and getting paid. In the case of the LGV apprenticeship this will be working as a Large Goods Vehicle (LGV) driver but may also include other duties i.e. in the warehouse.

How long does an apprenticeship last?

The apprenticeship will last for a minimum of 13 months.

What level is the apprenticeship?

The LGV driver intermediate apprenticeship is at level 2.

Progression opportunities on completion of Apprenticeship

There are various opportunities available such as completing further training and gaining an ADR licence to drive hazardous goods or gaining driving experience and become an LGV instructor or moving into transport planning or management.

Induction

This is two days in duration with SP Training and on average around fourteen days with the employer. The induction explains what will be covered during the apprenticeship with SP Training and in the workplace with the employer.

Professional Driver Programme

This covers the driver training and tests. LGV apprentices need to pass either Category C (rigid) or Category C+E (artic) in order to legally drive LGVs on the road for work. They also need training to achieve the following competencies:

- Driving, Loading & Unloading
- Customer Care
- Legislation
- Safe and Fuel Efficient Driving
- Environmental Issues

Maths & English

This apprenticeship requires a minimum of level 1 maths & English.

If the candidate is already in possession of maths and English at level 1 then they will be supported to achieve level 2. If they already have level 2 they will be supported to achieve level 3 and beyond.

Level 1 is equivalent to grade D-E (3-2) GCSE and level 2 is equivalent to Grade A-C (9-4) GCSE.

Entry Requirements

Candidates must already hold provisional licence for category C (rigid).



What Qualifications Will Be Achieved?

At the end of the apprenticeship the following training and qualifications will have been achieved:

- Category C (Rigid) driving licence or category C+E (Artic) driving licence
- Initial Driver Certificate of Professional Competence (Driver CPC)
- 35 hours of ongoing Driver Certificate of Professional Competence (Driver CPC)
- Maths & English level 1 and/or 2 Functional Skills
- The Apprentice may also achieve employer specific qualifications: i.e. First Aid, Health & Safety, Fork Lift Truck

What Is Required From You the Employer?

For the majority of apprenticeships, the employer is required to allow the apprentice time to study and take assessments. We will advise in advance as much as possible to facilitate work planning.

The employer is also asked to facilitate visits from SP Training assessors to both assess competency and monitor training performance and competence.

Please note that before joining an apprenticeship programme, all applicants will need to be assessed to determine their level of English and maths and an Eligibility Check will also need to be carried out.
